UNITY CARE ROADMAP TO END FOSTER YOUTH HOMELESSNESS

In 2018, we started a journey of assessment and planning to build on our 25-year foundation of serving our community's most vulnerable population: youth in the foster care system. We were honored to be selected as part of the grantee cohort of the Edna McConnell Clark Foundation's PropelNext initiative.

PropelNext helps promising nonprofits transform their passion for serving disadvantaged youth into data-driven insights and practices that amplify their impact on young peoples' lives. Our work with PropelNext has helped us hone and enhance our client services using data-driven decision-making.

In 2020, in partnership with PropelNext, we launched a 7-month intensive strategic planning process led by the Stanford Graduate School of Business Alumni Consulting Team (ACT).


The outcome is Unity Care's new five-year strategic plan that fortifies our impact on foster youth success.

We conducted extensive internal analysis and external research before developing the core initiatives. Each initiative has specific strategies, tactics to drive operations, and milestones to measure our progress on the path to success.




OUR GOAL

Focusing our efforts on these initiatives will enable us to double the capacity of our housing continuum from 150 beds to 300 beds, thus housing twice as many foster youth and multiplying our impact on eliminating foster youth homelessness.

OUR HOUSING CONTINUUM MODEL

Our housing continuum offers a variety of housing options (dorm-style, shared and independent) providing increased levels of independent living, as youth and emerging adults mature and gain skills for self-sufficiency.
